

Some thoughts from the St. Mary's Manse

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus speaks about the saving grace of our Sovereign God and say **"People will come from the east and west and north and south, and will take their place at the feast in the Kingdom of God!"**

I often use these words as a call to worship when leading worship on St. Martin's and St. Mary's; indeed they seem very appropriate during the summer months when we welcome visitors from all over the world who come to experience for themselves something of the beauty and tranquility of these remote islands in which our Methodist Church plays such an important part.

On St. Mary's in particular, visitors often join us for our mid-week meetings and it has been good over the summer months to have welcomed visitors at our Friday Fellowship evenings, when often the speakers have also been guests from the mainland, or even further away, as in the case of the Nigerian bishops visiting last year.

On Thursday evenings we have been meeting at Seagull Cottage on St. Mary's, praying for revival, and it has been a great joy to have had visitors join us at these meetings and to find that we are not alone in meeting to pray for a fresh outpouring of Gods' Spirit upon His people. It has been a very uplifting exercise to meet with Christians from all over Britain who, like us, feel the need of this type of prayer. Some speak of how their churches have become more determined in seeking fresh opportunities for mission and service as a result of these meetings, and how things are changing for the better. This is our hope or these islands, and we rejoice that there are a growing number of people from churches of all denominations who have caught this vision for the future of our precious Christian faith in our nation.

August is certainly the month that we hope to welcome visitors to our islands, and it is also the month that for many years we have held our annual children's holiday club on St. Mary's. As in previous years, Gordon Bird and his team have in place a weekend of fun with Bible based activities. This event is always popular with our island children, and children visiting from the mainland will often join us. This year the holiday club starts on Monday August 4th. For more details and offers of help telephone Gordon on 422550.

On Sunday 3rd August we shall be holding our evening worship at 7pm on the quay at St. Mary's. For the last few years we have had an evening service in August where we worship outdoors on the quay by kind permission of the harbourmaster. We try to time it so that we are singing our closing hymn at sunset, and these evenings seem very popular with our visitors, as does our annual St. Mary's Lifeboat Service which is held on Holgate's Green in July (subject to the weather).

The Bible is of course full of examples of people gathering outdoors; indeed, most of Jesus' teaching was not in the synagogues of His day, but instead in the countryside or the shores of the Sea of Galilee. Sometimes here on Scilly, especially during the summer months, on our wonderful beaches we can just imagine Jesus speaking there about the Kingdom of God to those who had gathered.

Each of our four Gospels tells of the prophet-like figure of John the Baptist whose entire ministry took place out among the people. We are told of how he lived in the desert, and how he baptised those who came to him in the river of Jordan. Some have said that this is what we need today, a prophet sent from God, a voice that will again remind our nation of the ways and values of God's

Kingdom, and a church leader who will challenge the many things which keep us from truly living lives that are pleasing to God

Yes, John the Baptist, just like the prophets before him, had a tremendous impact upon the people of his day. He reminded all of their need to take stock of their lives and to repent. He spoke of how it is possible to make a fresh start in life, and he spoke of how by receiving Jesus as their promised saviour, new hope could again be seen in their nation. Historical records from that time speak of how large numbers of people came from Judea and Jerusalem to be baptised by John in the river Jordan. Those who had lost hope came to hear his message; lives were changed, and the bible tells us that many were challenged by his call to repentance, and found that by trusting in the promises of God they could make a fresh start in life.

Whenever I read about John the Baptist and his outdoor ministry to the people of his day, I find myself asking the question: **'Just how many of those who came to be baptised by John did in time come to truly believe in Jesus?'** I expect some who had been baptized by John would have been there later when Jesus fed the five thousand with loaves and fishes, and it is quite likely that some may have been in Bethany when, at the end of His ministry, Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead. So, what real difference did John make to the lives of those he baptised in the river Jordan? And I wonder how many of them were there to witness for themselves how Jesus was condemned by the people of His day and led out to die between two criminals on the Cross of Calvary?

In a sense, these same questions could be asked about us. Time and again we hear that invitation from God to repent and make a fresh start in our lives, and we have also heard the message of how by truly believing in Jesus we may find hope and the promise of life eternal. But where is the evidence of this change on our daily lives? Are we more loving and kind than we once were? Are we slower to condemn and quicker to offer forgiveness than we once were, and does our Church on these beautiful islands truly reflect the ways and the values of this Gospel message in this very special Island community?

So we give thanks for those who travel from afar to worship with us in our chapels on St. Martin's and St. Mary's, and for those who gather for worship on St. Mary's quay in August. We pray that our message to those who gather will be the same as that of John the Baptist – that we will make time to stop, to think, to repent, and to be directed to Jesus the Son of God so that we shall each be ready for the promised coming of His Kingdom. We His Church have been called to baptise with water, but those who are baptised by us truly repent and receive Jesus as Lord will they then, and only then, truly know the joy of being baptised in His Holy Spirit.

Next month we shall celebrate God's provision in our lives at our Harvest Thanksgiving services on St. Martin's and St. Mary's. God's promises are true and His Word can be trusted, and we shall continue to meet and pray earnestly for the coming of His Kingdom on these remote yet stunning islands. Our Harvest Thanksgiving this year on St. Martins is on the 7th September at 6pm, and on the following day in the evening we meet for a short service in the chapel, followed by our annual harvest sale in the Chapel Sunday School room. This is always a lively event with Christopher Savill as our auctioneer, and refreshments will be served by members of the chapel. Please let me

know if you intend to join us so that boating arrangements can be made.

Our Harvest celebrations on St. Mary's will take place on 21st September, with our Harvest Thanksgiving at 10,30am and a special Harvest Songs of Praise at 8pm. As in previous years, on the Saturday of harvest weekend (September 20th) we shall be holding a gift day at the manse on St. Mary's. Please do come along any time between 9am and 8pm to contribute to our chapel funds; refreshments will be served at the manse throughout the day. I know that many of our friends from the mainland like to send donations on our gift day to help the mission of our church. Where does the Methodist Church go in the light of recent government legislation on marriage ?

This Act Reads: Marriage of same sex couple is now lawful.

In these seven short words, section 1(1) of the Marriage (Same Sex Couples) Act 2013 enacted a fundamental change of the law of England and Wales. What will our response be as a church?

In June of this year, our minister was asked to represent the Cornwall District of the Methodist Church at the Methodist Conference. Part of this seven day conference was to hear a report from the church working party on marriage and civil partnerships as regards this change in law. Starting in September on Friday evenings at 7.30 on St. Mary's, a series of meeting will be held to look at the details and implications for Methodists here on Scilly.

Week 1	Setting out the background of where we are today.
Week 2	Themes which have emerged form the report.
Week 3	A cross-section of comments from the connexion.
Week 4	Emerging thoughts form the consultation.
Week 5	Should the Methodist Church's position be revisited?

MUNDESLEY --- Meeting with the young people at Mundesley on my monthly trips has been great. It's simply a time of games, fun and relationship building. Getting to know them and showing them Christians are down-to-earth, everyday people that they can relate to. There's nothing heavy or structured, and it's great. If any of the young people want to ask questions, that's great, and if not, that's fine too.

TAG CONNECTOR --- is held at the school, offering young people the opportunity to be challenged and ask questions. It's a half hour session with a game, some food and a short video or talk that's thought provoking, about God, the Christian faith or a relevant issue from a Christian perspective and a time for questions. There's usually anywhere between three and twelve young people who come and I've been really moved by some of the questions the young people have. Big thanks to Anthea Roberts who has been amazing with a steady supply of hot pizza cooked just before the Connector sessions - and this month she even brought some ice lollies along to cool us all down! ALPHA FOR ADULTS --- The alpha video talks explore who Jesus is, prayer, the bible, guidance and much more. Very inspiring and challenging too. So much food for thought! So many opinions, thoughts and personal stories are shared during the discussion time which has been really encouraging, and lots of positive comments shared personally by individuals who feel they are growing, learning and being really inspired. More big thanks to Heather & Ian for their help with the catering during the first few months, it's really appreciated.

CY --- Jono, Emily & Tianna continue to inspire me with the depth of their faith and their fantastic personalities! They've chosen to follow Jesus and we're looking at what this looks like in their day to day lives. We've been joined by Gemma Chapman who's helped out with some of the sessions when Lynne's been away, and were joined spontaneously by another young person who had come to Connector last month, and it was great to welcome him too.





MENTORING — Mentoring on the mainland has come to it's natural end due to the end of an academic year and Grace returning to Scilly for the summer. I've enjoyed meeting with her for lunch whilst over in July and also meeting with Catherine for coffee too - she's back from Uni for the summer on Scilly. Being a part of their lives is a real privilege.


Are you left-handed?

4th August – Time for Lights Out!

Every householder in Britain is being asked to turn out their lights at 11pm on 4th August, to mark the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War.

The nationwide event is based on the famous comment attributed to Sir Edward Grey, the Foreign Secretary, on the eve of the conflict in 1914. He said: "The lamps are going out all over Europe; we shall not see them lit again in our lifetime." He made the remark the day before war was declared, as he gazed across St James's Park from his window at the Foreign Office at the gas lamps being lit.

The switch-off is being called Lights Out, and is backed by the Government as "one of the most dramatic UK-wide events ever organised." Throughout the UK, everyone is being invited to "turn off their lights and to replace them with one single light, to remember a day that changed the world forever."

The 'Lights Out' will take place at the same time as a candlelit vigil of prayers, readings and music held in Westminster Abbey. There candles will be extinguished one by one until a single flame is snuffed out at 11pm.
