As I sit in my warm and comfortable study writing this letter in mid January, we are in the midst of some chilly weather, even here on the mild Isles of Scilly. Our thoughts and prayers are with those who have to be out and about in all weathers: Our Boatmen, Our Medical Team, Our Farmers, Our Postmen and Island Carriers, Our Milkmen, those at our tiny Airport, and those other essential workers who

we rely upon to care for those in our remote island community.

For most it seems that the Isles of Scilly is a fine place to live, but how do we make judgements about our community? Is it how we care for the vulnerable, those who live alone, the elderly, and those with special needs?

I was delighted recently to be invited by our Island Council to attend a meeting to look at how we may improve our care for the elderly here on Scilly. Surely how we care for the elderly will be an important aspect of our thoughts when we come to make judgements about where we live?

At the other end of life maybe we are judged by how we care for the children and young people who will be the Scillonians of tomorrow. We are thankful for our schools, for future visions of making yet more improvements in education, and for those who work with children and young people out of school hours. Again I am delighted to be invited into our school bases, to lead assemblies and to

offer support for the hard- working teachers and staff. In January there will be the first meeting at our Island Council Offices of SACRE (The Isles of Scilly Standing Advisory Council for Religious Education). We do indeed rejoice that even today in this high-tech and fast moving world that we have grasped how religion still has a crucial part to play in our community.

How then do we judge our common life here on Scilly? Is it by our attendance at church and chapel, for during our summer months we rejoice as visitors join us in worship, but maybe the winter months remind us that there are still many who do not see the need of weekly worship and of how important this has been in our island community over many generations here on these fine islands.

My Prayer is this....

Lord God, strengthen your Church we pray, that we may serve and care for one another, that the young and the old will be valued, and that the vulnerable will find hope upon their journey. Grant this we pray as we seek to follow the way of Jesus and live out our Christian faith in acts of Human Kindness

Amen

If the children enjoyed themselves, I believe the watching grown ups had a good time too, taking pleasure from witnessing youngsters having fun! After supper the evening was rounded off with games and quizzes for the adults. Donations for Action for Children totaled £95.

Christmas, very much a family time, saw some of our members visiting their children on the mainland, whilst others welcomed them home to Scilly. Chris Hensleigh, Daph and Derek were joined by their sisters, who always worship with us. The freezing conditions delayed Celia's and Rodney's return from Norfolk by a week, but we are glad to have them home again now.

Charlie has been making good use of the Medical Launch each Wednesday, using the time when a doctor is conducting surgery to visit one home on St.Martin's. Once a month he has stayed overnight and held a Fellowship Meeting.

Lent – a good time to pray

Lent is traditionally a time when Christians take stock of themselves spiritually. They set aside extra time for prayer. So there you are, tentatively wanting to pray... Here are some helpful things to remember as you settle down to it: People have been praying since Adam had a grandson named Enosh. At least the Bible tells us in Genesis 4:26 that it was during his days when 'men began to call on the name of the Lord'. They have been doing it ever since. People have been answered by God since Genesis, too. But if you want to read some beautiful prayers – and answers to them, browse through the Psalms. Again and again the psalmist writes: 'the Lord heard my cry'.

So – what do you need to bring to prayer? Just the tiniest amount of faith that God is even there.... Jesus assures us that even faith as big as a tiny mustard seed will be effective.

What gives you the right to come before Almighty God? Jesus does. The Bible is clear that 'there is one mediator between God and men, the man Jesus Christ'. (1 Tim 2:5). The Bible makes clear that god does not stand on ceremony

- he wants our personal, spontaneous prayers. Jesus was very matter of fact about it: 'When you pray, go into you're- He wants our personal, spontaneous prayers. Jesus was unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you.' (Matthew 6:6).

The Bible assures us that prayer will bring us good things: 'we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time

of need'. (Hebrews 4:16)

Above all, prayer must be made with a pure heart. 'If I had cherished sin in my heart, the Lord would not have listened.' (Psalm 66:18). That simply means that if you know you are doing something wrong, and intend to keep right on doing it, don't waste your time praying.

Finally, what can be the results of your prayers this Lent?

Well, here are seven, for starters....

- 1. Joy and deep happiness. (John 16:24)
- Relief from your worry, stress and tension (Philippians 4:6,7)
- 3. Wisdom and more mental clarity (James 1:5,6)
- Protection and deliverance from temptations (Matthew 26:41)
- An ability to share the Good News of Jesus to other people (Matthew 9:38)
- Strength to persevere when you feel under spiritual attack (Ephesians 6:18)
- A growing thankfulness to God, who is worthy of all glory (Revelation 4:11)

Action For children

Do We Have as Much Sense as God Gave Geese?

Ever wondered why geese fly in a V formation? As each goose flaps its wings, it creates an "uplift" for the birds that follow. By flying in a V formation, the whole flock adds 71% greater flying range than if each bird flew alone.

People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going much quicker and easier because they are travelling on the thrust of each other.

When a goose falls out of formation it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of flying alone, it quickly moves back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front of it.

If we have as much sense as a goose, we stay in formation with those headed where we want to go. We are willing to accept their help and give our help to others.

When the lead bird tires, it rotates back into formation to take advantage of the bird immediately in front of it.

It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing leadership. As with geese people are interdependent on each others skills, capabilities and unique arrangement of gifts, talents, or resources.

The geese flying in formation honk to encourage those in front to keep up their speed. We need to make sure our

honking is encouraging. In groups where there is encouragement, the production is much greater. The power of encouragement (to stand by one's heart or core values and to encourage the heart and core values of others) is the honking we seek.

When a goose gets sick, wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help and protect it. They stay with it until it dies or is able to fly again. Then they launch out with another formation or catch up with the flock.

If we have as much sense as God gave the goose, we will stand by each other in difficult times as well as when we are strong.



By the time this goes out I'm sure everyone will already know but we would still like to send our love and congratulations to Beth and Matt on the safe arrival of baby Joseph.


The Presentation of Christ in the Temple/ Candlemas


In bygone centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the Christmas season on Candlemas, 2 February. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to "present him to the Lord". At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas.

The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke 2:22-40. Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is of course found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West. But in medieval times, the Nunc Dimittis was mostly used just on this day, during the distribution of candles before the Eucharist. Only gradually did it win a place in the daily prayer life of the Church.
