# Thoughts from the Manse ......

Dear Friends,

'Thinking is the best way to travel' Lyrics of a song from the 1960's – forgive the pun but it set me thinking.

Paul wrote to Roman Christians (Chapter 12:2) 'don't be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your minds, so you may discern what is God's will?' Hopefully as Christians and nonconformists we appreciate this and recognise we need the help of God's spirit.

Centuries earlier Isaiah wrote 'those of steadfast mind, you keep a peace because they trust in you (Isaiah 26:3). Revd. Unfortunately the sailing was not the best so we were very pleased to see the number of Cornish friends who braved the elements to join us for the day. A service was held in front of St Mary's Methodist Church and was followed by a lunch provided by both St Mary's and St Martin's Methodist friends. It was a very enjoyable visit.

Sadly, early September saw the passing of a true Christian gentleman. Kenneth Jackson Cocking, who celebrated his 99<sup>th</sup> birthday in June, was a beacon of light to us all. His Christian example will be much missed by all who knew him. His funeral was held at St Mary's Methodist Church on Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> September. The service was taken jointly by the Revd. Michael Pullan, the Revd. Jane Willcock and Canon Perran Gay who gave the address. Many of the family travelled over from Cornwall for the service.

We were given a talk by Fiona Maybrey about her recent visit to the Philippians as part of the Christian Aid 'Island to Island Appeal'. This appeal was launched last year and there has been a pledge by our Island Churches to donate £5,000.00 over three years.

#### God is faithful

This October I will be speaking at the 83<sup>rd</sup> anniversary of the Methodist Chapel where I grew up. It is a privilege and an honour to return to the place where I came to know Christ some 50 years ago, and to encourage the folks who have served faithfully in this little mining village over many years.

I have it in mind to speak to them about the faithfulness of God, the fact that God has never let us down and never will. That is the rock on which our Christian witness rests – the utter reliability of God. Like a good preacher there are three things I want to say:

God IS faithful. It is His nature to remain the same and not to change. This is why we can rely on Him and His promises, and believe that His purposes will come to pass. He will never change His mind or renege on His word. Over the years this is one of the most reassuring things we come to know about our God.

God HAS BEEN faithful. A backward glance is more than simple nostalgia. It enables us to see the many times when God demonstrated His love and power towards us. Our history (both personally and as communities) confirms to us that God has never let us down or failed us. It is worth telling some of the stories in our shared experience to remind us of this. Memories reinforce our faith for the future. We must not live in the past, but we must learn from it.

God WILL BE faithful. The nature of God and our experience of His ways provides the basis for our trust when looking to the future. What He has promised will come to pass; what He has started will be completed. When times are uncertain and the future unknown, this is the bedrock of our faith. Hudson Taylor, the great missionary to China, translated Mark 11:22 as 'Hold the faithfulness of God.' It is not our faith that matters as much as the faithfulness of God. That is the ground of our hope.



#### Be Sociable

If you can continue a healthy social life during middle age and onwards, you might be able to prevent the onset of dementia.

It has been found that people of 60 or over who see family and friends almost every day have a 12 per cent lower risk of developing the disease. According to the research done at University College London (UCL), frequent social contact builds cognitive reserve, or greater brain resilience, against the damage that occurs in neuro-degeneration.

As one scientist explains, "Dementia is a major global health challenge, with one million people expected to have the condition in the UK by 2021. But we also know that one in three cases are potentially preventable."
